What is a CONCLUSION?

 A conclusion is a short paragraph that aims to provide a well-rounded <u>END</u> to your essay.

Ways to start a conclusion:

"In conclusion", "All in all", "In a nutshell", "In sum"

What you **SHOULD** include in your conclusion

- 1. Simple <u>reiteration</u> of your main points.
- 2. Proper <u>justification</u> of your stand.
- 3. A <u>call-to-action/resolution</u> to your essay.

REITERATION OF YOUR MAIN POINTS

Reiteration of points = State your points in brief

- You do not want to ramble on about the points that you had already explained earlier in your body paragraphs,
- Take this as an opportunity to make it clear to the marker what your points are and how they were segregated (which were the arguments and which were the counter-arguments).
- Take 1-2 lines to re-state your points. REMEMBER you are **NOT explaining** them, just stating!

E.g. "All in all, awards and prizes continue to serve a very useful purpose in today's society by providing many with an opportunity to be recognised for their commendable efforts, as well as serve as provide a boost of confidence in empowering people and building strong characters."

JUSTIFICATION OF YOUR STAND

- In order for you to able to justify your stand, there has to be an underlying reason/criteria that comes paired with it.
 - E.g. Since benefits > drawbacks and with this issue being inherent in society → lustified stand.
- Use your conclusion as an opportunity to bring across why your stand is justified

Reasons for a stand to be **justified**:

- Benefits > Drawbacks
- Feasibility
- Long-Term implications
- Root Cause

E.g. "However, it can be impractical in some context, such as in the area of adulthood, as well as may act as a double-edged sword when abused or over-emphasised."

CALL-TO-ACTION/RESOLUTION

- A nice way to end off your essay would be to have a strong resolution.

Various ways to end:

- Call-to-action
- Long-Term effects/outlook
- Link the issue of the question to society today

E.g. "Moving forward, there is a need to stigmatise awards as an 'added bonus' for an achievement, while the lessons learnt from going through the process should remain as the primary focus."
